

## **A Pilgrim's Progress**

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther walked up to the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany and nailed his 95 Theses to the door. In those days the church door served as the bulletin board for the community. The theses were statements of concern that Luther had about the church which he wanted to discuss and debate. Martin Luther invited people to a public debate of his theses and requested that those who could not be present to present their debate in writing. Initially, no one responded to Luther's invitation to debate. Soon people were responding. The common people were responding with enthusiasm, and the church leaders were responding with alarm. The issues Luther raised became such hot issues that the church was reformed and Protestantism born.

Our word, protest, is derived from the Latin, protestari which means a witness for; to state positively; affirm solemnly; assert. Protest means to make a solemn affirmation. What Martin Luther did was to make a solemn affirmation that salvation comes to each person by the grace of God and that all people can present their needs to God and that God does and will relate directly with them. At the time that Luther posted his 95 Theses he was studying and teaching the letter to the Romans to his students. It was his study of Romans that led him to his conclusions and to the writing and posting of the 95 Theses.

What made the hair on the back of Luther's neck stand up was papal indulgences, release from purgatory being contingent upon payment by a relative or friend. The sinners of the Empire, all devout believers, worried about their destinations beyond death; all of them expected to roast, at least for awhile, in eternal flames. These citizens of the Empire, for a specific sum of money, could shorten their stay in hell. They could decrease the demerits chalked up against them on the celestial scorecard by cashing in on the merits of Christ and the saints of the ages. God's goodness and grace went up for sale; a smart investor could claim a piece of heaven, not only for himself but with an additional premium, could claim a piece for his family, ancestors and progeny. The 95 Theses nailed to the church door triggered more than a debate; those theses became marching orders for a church, a nation, a continent. And Martin Luther scholar, teacher, pastor, preacher; impeccably orthodox and loyal became what he least intended or desired to be: a prophetic reformer.

What Luther started unintentionally we need to keep going intentionally. Individuals and congregations are constantly in need of reform. Constantly we need to permit the love and grace of God to penetrate every corner of our lives. Continually we need God's love to reshape and reform us into better people and better servants of God.

Sunday, October 31st, is Reformation Sunday. Whether you are able to join us for worship or not, I hope you will explore areas in your life that you would like reformed and how God's love and grace can reshape and reform you into a better person and a better servant of God. May the Reformation continue in vou and me.

# Travel to Israel and Palestin



Hands of Peace is sponsoring for the very first time a trip to Israel and Palestine on October 23 through November 3 of 2011.

We will visit the major spiritual sites in the region (Jewish, Christian and Muslim) and explore in depth both sides of the political conflict. We expect to visit Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Hebron, Sderot, Ramallah, the Dead Sea, the Galilee, and Haifa among other places (itinerary is currently being planned).

Hands of Peace is partnering with MEJDI (Middle East Justice and Development Initiatives), a unique tour operator coowned by three experts in the field of conflict resolution: Rabbi Marc Gopin (of George Mason University), Palestinian peace activist Aziz Abu-Sarah, and Middle East peace researcher Scott Cooper.

The current cost is estimated (with airfare) at \$3500--\$4000 (details are being worked out)

## WHY IS THIS TRIP DIFFERENT FROM ALL **OTHER TRIPS?**

MEJDI will provide us with two top-notch guides: one Israeli and one Palestinian, so that our intimate group (about 30 people) will receive both points of view throughout the trip.

Our "in-house" tour facilitator will be Ron Miller, professor of Religion at Lake Forest College, co-founder of Common Ground, and Board member of Hands of Peace. Ron will lead reflections and dialogue on each day's experiences.

We will visit with selected "Hands" and their families during the trip, and hope to include an Alumni Club follow-up meeting as part of the encounter.

Total Pledge collections YTD September 2010 (defined as Current Pledges, Non-Pledges, Pledge Overage, and Prior Year Pledges) totaled \$657,399 compared to a budget of \$711,800. These four revenue lines are shown separately below. Comparatively, Total Pledge collections YTD September 2009 totaled \$763,116 with a budget of \$677,409.

## Things keep sprouting at GCC

The Rainbow Garden continues to produce a bountiful harvest for us and we've continued to pick tomatoes, egaplant, habanero, and sweet banana pepper bringing our total harvest from the garden to something approaching 350 pounds. Considering how many families 2 oz of basil can serve, this is an amazing number! The success of this garden and the wonderful growing season we experienced this year has exceeded all of our wildest dreams! The Organic Pantry Project is so very grateful to GCC for the partnership that has allowed this to happen. PYF helped TOPP put the garden to bed for the winter by completing the final harvest, pulling the remaining plants and cutting them into small pieces for better composting, and covering the beds with raked leaves and straw.




### on the horizon for Topp:

On Oct 17, the 4th and 5th graders joined TOPP's VP, Laura Heyser, in the kitchen. Together they produced 16 mini loaves of banana bread which were donated to the Northfield Food Pantry. TOPP will continue to work with Sunday schoolers throughout the winter to help support the NFP by finding creative uses for temporary food overages so that nothing goes to waste. Banana bread and banana chips are just the beginning!

Our goal is not just to provide healthy, organic food but also to do so without creating waste. We are currently surveying consumers to determine crop needs for next season.
- TOPP is very pleased to announce a new partnership! Thanks to GCC's wonderful Rainbow Garden and all the success we've had here, we are in communication with several other organizations about creating more community gardens. Most recently, TOPP has partnered with The New Church and we are excited to incorporate some of their wonderful ideas into the GCC garden in 2011.
